

Select Major Religious Observances in Academic Year 2023-24 (July 2023 through June 2024)

Members of the Emory community observe many diverse religious holidays. According to the university Religious Accommodation Policy (Policy 10.17), Emory seeks to provide reasonable accommodation for work scheduled on religious holidays.

In order to avoid the need for many accommodations, it is best to avoid scheduling major assignments, exams, meetings, and events on the dates below that are observed by large numbers in the Emory community. There are more religious traditions and holidays than are listed here.

Shemini Atzeret/Simchat Torah	Judaism	Eve October 6 through October 8, 2023 after nightfall

Christmas	Christianity	December 25, 2023
Orthodox Christmas	Orthodox Christianity	January 7, 2024

Purim	Judaism	Eve March 23 through day March 24, 2024

Orthodox Easter	Orthodox Christianity	May 5, 2024
Shavuot	Judaism	Eve June 11 through June 13, 2024 after nightfall
Eid al-Adha	Islam	Eve June 16 through day June 17, 2024

Muslim holidays are based on a lunar calendar, and the actual dates are determined by direct observation of the moon as announced by the mosque. Christian holidays also begin on the eve of the dates listed.
